LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Sunflower Mission Family,

In a middle school play I was cast as Hellen Keller. One line that resonated with me is a well-known quote "Alone we can do so little. Together we can do so much." These words come to mind when reflecting on Sunflower Mission's work this past year. There would be no Sunflower Mission without our supporters and volunteers. Together we have brought hope for a better life to our students and together we have witnessed the transformative power of education.

In 2019, we built 7 classrooms at the Pang Tieng School in Lam Dong. We added 2 classrooms each to our An Hiep School in Ben Tre and Lac Chi School in Phu Yen and renovated another 8. These additions have made it possible for over 300 students to attend elementary school in a safe environment. We awarded 1,382 scholarships for Kinder - 12th grade students and 154 scholarships at the college level. 50 scholarship recipients graduated from college. Together we made a difference!

SM's 2019 annual fundraiser was Step Right Up, which not only captured the carnival themed event but also the enthusiasm of our supporters and volunteers throughout the years. There is no greater cooperative effort than when people of all ages and backgrounds "step up" to support our work. This annual report features their stories.

SM believes that leadership and civic education for the next generation are important. We prepare our next generation of leaders by giving them greater responsibilities and voices in our decision making. This includes being a representative at the round table discussion led by the Michelle Obama Girls' Education Alliance. In Viet Nam, former scholarship recipients come back to volunteer with us, taking on leadership roles. In the U.S., our young members are invited to all board meetings and are engaged in our work and fundraising efforts.

As we embark on a new decade, we remain steadfast in our belief that education is the only sustainable way to change the world. We recognize that we alone cannot do much without your trust, generosity, and compassionate support. Let's continue to "step up" so that together we can change lives! WE CARE!

Sunflower Mission's sole purpose is to improve education standards for children in Viet Nam through building schools, providing scholarships, organizing an annual work camp, and service. Each initiative requires many dedicated volunteers and countless hours to plan and execute while maintaining SM's secondary goal: a family-friendly atmosphere. This camaraderie is something we can feel but can be difficult to describe, until the 2019 work camp in Păng Tiên, Đà Lạt.

In the first week of camp, individuals commuted over 70 minutes, daily, to reach the school building site. During this commute we got to know each other. We started out as strangers, however, after a few days our bond was strengthened. This bond could be felt between work campers and the locals.

We had a friendly soccer game between work campers and locals, before saying good-bye. Unlike previous games, this year, one of our work campers suffered a twisted ankle. The concern among everyone was clear. Most of us are not medical professionals. But as family members, we sprang into action. As the patient was being transported to the hospital, the rest of the team rallied to make sure the family members of the patient were cared for. These small actions speak volumes and reflect the true character of SM's work campers.

True to the Vietnamese proverb “Một con ngựa đau cả tàu bỏ cỏ”. Translate: when a horse is ill, the entire herd gave up eating. The mood was significantly somber after that night.

The sense of sadness broke when the injured joined the team for breakfast, on crutches. The focus shifted to figuring out who would take turns staying with this individual as they healed. A sense of relief and normalcy had returned to the herd! It can be difficult to describe the close-knit nature of the group, but the spirit of our supporters really come through during difficult times.

We are Sunflower Mission. We care!

On January 13, 2019, Mahtab, a 7th grader at Kleb Intermediate School was struck with an idea. It all started with Hurricane Harvey. "I was affected by Hurricane Harvey and lost basically all my books," recounts Mahtab. "I really missed having them, and that's when it struck me that so many other children around the globe never have the chance to read books. I knew that I wanted to change that. I emailed Mrs. Vaughan and told her about my idea, and asked for her help. Of course...being the wonderful librarian she is, said 'sure!'"

The following week, Mahtab and I met in the library to discuss her idea. There were so many questions to answer! Who would we help first? Where was the greatest need? How would language and culture factor in? Through our inquiry, we discovered that Vietnam was a country that had a large population of people learning the English language and a great need for books. She decided Vietnam would be the country she would help.

There were more questions to ponder. What types of books? For which age groups? English or Vietnamese? How would we get the books to Vietnam? We began to research organizations in the Houston-area that we could partner with. After several calls we found Sunflower Mission. Sunflower Mission was planning to send a team of 40 volunteers to open a K-5 school in June 2019 and was in need of English books for the school's library! The timing could not have been more perfect!

Plans for collecting books for Vietnam kicked into high gear. There was so much to do and only a few months left of school to get it all done! Mahtab created a flyer and video about her book drive that was sent to all the librarians in Klein ISD asking if their libraries would be willing to donate two picture books each. The books were collected in April, and delivered to Sunflower Mission in May. From there, the books would travel with Sunflower Mission's volunteer team to the new schools in Vietnam and be dedicated, along with the school in June of 2019.

"So many people were involved in making this happen," says Mahtab. "Thank you so much to Mrs. Vaughan, the schools in Klein ISD, and of course Sunflower Mission, for making all this possible!"

STEPPING RIGHT UP TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

In 2010, Le Hoang Nguyen took his two young sons Ryan and Cooper (then, 14 and 12 years old) on a work camp with Sunflower Mission (SM) in Vietnam. After returning, the father promised he would build a business that would lend him freedom and resources to impact the trajectory of the lives of the students he encountered while in Vietnam. Nguyen believes education is the only way to break the cycle of poverty for these students.

In 2017, Nguyen started to implement his promise. In 2019, he STEPPED UP in a way that inspired others to follow in his footsteps. Below are two stories that exemplify how we can change the world through education, one student at a time.

The gift of generosity: "I met Sharon Lemons at Fenway Park when the Astros played the Red Sox in game 4 of the ALDS. After following me on Instagram, she sent me a message offering to donate her company's suite at Minute Maid Park for a game between the Rangers & Astros. She wanted to help raise money

for SM by raffling off the suite. The value of the prize: \$4,000. We were able to raise more than \$20,000!

When she heard that number, she donated her suite again, raising another \$5,100. Her efforts alone sent 65 students to college for 1 year!

The gift of friendship, from the heart: I met Stephen Hanser and his son, Erik, at an Astros vs. Phillies game. They were in the middle of their father-and-son trip to various baseball ballparks. I gave Erik a used game ball because we shared a love of the game. We met again in 2018 at Fenway Park for a game between the Astros and the Red Sox.

Last season, Stephen donated \$500 to SM for a chance to win an Astros suite. When he won, he flew in from Bristol, Connecticut with his kids to attend the game; giving away the remaining 8 tickets to military families.

Stephen was my guest of honor at the SM fundraising event, STEP RIGHT UP. After attending, Stephen became an ambassador for Sunflower Mission. Stephen bought a suite at Fenway Park with 18 tickets for a game between the Astros & Red Sox. He's selling \$75 raffle tickets to help raise money for SM. Stephen is STEPPING RIGHT UP TO THE PLATE. Thank you, Stephen!"

THE IMPACT OF ONE SCHOLARSHIP

Ms. Trang is a leader of Vietnam Maritime Commercial Joint Stock Bank; Ms. Phung is a leader of Intel Viet Nam; Mr. Khanh is a vice leader of TUV SUD Vietnam. They are all former SAS (Sponsor-A-Student Scholarship) recipients. SAS was established to support students who have attended elementary schools built by SM and have been nurtured through SM's Dao-Le K-12 scholarship program. 85 of them have graduated and are now working successfully in various fields: education, engineering, medicine, business, etc. SAS students are not only good at their studies, but also hard working. Equally important, they have great hearts. They can take care of their life and they are willing to help those in need.

"When a person in the family is educated, he/she is likely to become better parents. When a child in a village has an opportunity to go to school, it brings hope to an entire community. When a human being is able to break the cycle of poverty through education, he or she helps to break that same cycle for others in a nation. What Sunflower Mission has been doing will gradually change the face of Vietnam to become a nation of knowledge and development. If Sunflower Mission does not come to build schools and give scholarships, there will be no generation of engineers, doctors, teachers of honest hearts, living and sharing with everyone."
—Ms. Phung, vice leader of SAS program in Vietnam & former scholarship recipient, said.

Ms. Phung, Mr. Khanh, Ms. Trang, Ms. Kim Phung, Mr. Tri, and Ms. Tien all came back to support Sunflower Mission after they graduated. More than 15% of former scholarship recipients decide to give back, a decision they made without any legal requirement or obligation imposed by SM.

The first time I met these individuals, I wondered how they could go to university with their situations— orphaned, motherless, fatherless, homeless even! As teenagers, they had to take care of everything from school fees, rent, material, even food. They came from rural hometowns to the big cities of Can Tho, Saigon, Da Nang, Ha Noi...so very alone! Look at them now: they have graduated and they are working to help others. SM is a place where everyone can share, help, and grow up together.

This year, SAS has 134 college students in the program. I strongly believe that we will have 134 engineers, teachers, doctors, and business professionals with great hearts tomorrow. Thank you so much to Sunflower Mission and SAS sponsors from the bottom of my heart!





